Pentagon test program a sham

Nationally recognized expert on federal contracting law, Professor Charles Tiefer has just released a new legal opinion on a 25-year-old Pentagon test program Tiefer describes the Comprehensive Subcontracting Plan Test Program (CSPTP) as a "sham.

Tiefer is a professor of Government Contracts at the University of Baltimore Law School and the co-author of GOVERNMENT CONTRACT LAW IN THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY. He was also the Commissioner from 2008-2011 on the Congressionally chartered, independent Commission on Wartime Contracting in Iraq and Afghanistan.



His legal opinion states, "To summarize: the Comprehensive Subcontracting Plan Test Program (CSPTP or "Test Program") (1) reduces vital opportunities for small business; and, (2) has a background of doubt and criticism. CSPTP is seriously harmful to small business. It should not have gotten its more than 20 years of extension as a never-tested "Test Program." Let it expire."

I couldn't agree more with Professor Tiefer. In fact, I think the CSPTP is probably the most anti-small business piece of legislation ever passed

Prior to the implementation of the CSPTP in 1990, all Pentagon prime contractors w

required to submit small business subcontracting plans on all major prime contracts detailing how they intended to achieve their small business subcontracting goals They were also required to submit quarterly and annual summary small business subcontracting

reports called SF 294's and SF 295's. These reports were publicly available and showed what the small business subcontracting goals were on the contracts and could be used to track a prime contractor's compliance with their small business subcontracting goals.

Prior to the implementation of the CSPTP, all Pentagon prime contractors could face "liquidated damages" for failing to make a good faith effort to achieve their small business subcontracting

Twenty-five years ago when the CSPTP was implemented, all of these requirements were completely eliminated for participating Pentagon prime contractors. No more publicly available small business subcontracting plans, no more publicly available subcontracting reports and the elimination of all penalties for prime contractors that did not comply with their required small

The CSPTP essentially removed all transparency regarding small business subcontracting programs and all penalties for non-compliance with small business subcontracting goals.

Did I mention that the stated goal of the CSPTP was to "increase subcontracting opportunities for

Who in their right mind could possibly believe eliminating all transparency and penalties in Pentagon small business subcontracting programs would ever "increase subcontracting

The United States Congress sure did. They thought the CSPTP was such a great plan to help small businesses they renewed the "test program" over and over for 25 years. Both the House and Senate versions of the FY 2015 National Defense Authorization bill include a renewal of the CSPTP into its 28th year of testing until 2017

In reality the CSPTP was never created to "increase subcontracting opportunities for small businesses." The CSPTP was created to create a colossal loophole in federal contracting law that allowed the Pentagon's largest and most politically influential prime contractors to completely ignore the Small Business Act and the small business subcontracting goals it mandated.

In 25 years the Pentagon has never released any information that the CSPTP ever "increased subcontracting opportunities for small businesses." Why not? Because it hasn't. Quite the contrary, the Pentagon is refusing to comply with my Freedom of Information Act requests for any detailed information on small business subcontract goals submitted by firms participating in

The CSPTP is one of the most shameful and disgusting examples of how our government actually operates. Corporate giants in the defense and aerospace industry were able to have the most anti-small business scheme in history approved by Congress for 25 years and now Congress wants to renew this "test program" until 2017. Unbelievable

There is no way of knowing for sure exactly how damaging the CSPTP has been for the nation's 28 million small businesses and the middle class economy over the last 25 years. Was it a trillion dollars in federal subcontracts that small businesses were cheated out of? Could it have been

I am suing the Pentagon in Federal District Court in San Francisco to force the release of subcontracting data submitted by participating prime contractors in the CSPTP. This data will no doubt prove the CSPTP was a fraud and a "sham." I know I will prevail because the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in 1994 that small business subcontracting data couldn't be withheld from Freedom of Information Act requests.

Even if Congress and President Obama decide to renew the most anti-small business legislation in American history into 2017, I expect to destroy it with my legal campaign and expose this staggering injustice against American small businesses in the courts.

Let me close with the final paragraph of Professor Tiefer's just released legal opinion on the CSPTP, "There is no doubt in my mind the CSPTP has significantly reduced subcontracting opportunities for small businesses. It should not have gotten its 25 years of extension as a nevertested "Test Program." Let it expire."
